### Chartered City

The City of Boulder City was incorporated on October 1, 1959 as a special charter City. Boulder City has a council/manager form of government.

### Mayor and Council Members

The Mayor and four City Council members are nonpartisan offices voted on at large. The Mayor serves as a member of the City Council and presides over its meetings. The Mayor has no administrative duties in the City, but is recognized as the head of the City government for all ceremonial purposes and for dealing with emergencies if the State or Federal Government imposes martial law on the City. A Mayor pro tem is appointed by members of the City Council each year and performs the duties of the Mayor during the Mayor’s absence.

The City Council, including the Mayor, is the governing body of the City and exercises legislative power by enacting ordinances, resolutions, orders, and other policies necessary for the management and execution of the powers vested in the City through the City Charter. The Mayor and City Council take action on all land use issues, expenditures of city funds, city ordinances, and various matters as set forth in the City Charter.

Members of the City Council also serve on various boards - Las Vegas Convention and Visitors Authority, Regional Transportation Commission, Regional Flood Control, District Board of Health, Southern Nevada Water Authority, Insurance Pool/Pact, Nevada League of Cities, Clark County Debt Management Commission, and Workforce Connections LED Board.

### Municipal Elections

Boulder City elections are held in even-numbered years. Elections for the offices of the Mayor and two Council members are conducted in one election year, while the other two Council members are elected in subsequent municipal election years. The Mayor and Council members are elected to serve four-year terms.

### Boulder City Municipal Elections are:

**NON PARTISAN, AT LARGE**

- Residents may vote for any candidate on the ballot, regardless of party affiliation.

The Primary Election must be held on the second Tuesday in June of each even-numbered year.

If, in the primary municipal election, a candidate receives votes equal to a majority of voters casting ballots in that election, he or she shall be considered elected to one of the vacancies and his or her name shall not be placed on the ballot for the general municipal election.

If required, General Elections must be conducted on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November of each even-numbered year.

## Qualified Elector

A qualified elector is any person who is 18 years of age, is a United States citizen and who has resided in this city for at least two years immediately prior to the election in which he/she is a candidate.

## Offices up for Election/Qualifications:

### City Council Member (2 Seats)

Qualifications for candidates are established in the Boulder City Charter, Section 5 as follows:

- No person shall be eligible for the office of Council member or Mayor unless he is a qualified elector of Boulder City and has been a resident of the City for at least 2 years immediately prior to the election in which he is a candidate.
- He shall hold no other elective public office, but he may hold a commission as a notary public or be a member of the Armed Forces reserve.
- No employee of the City or officer thereof, excluding City Council members, receiving compensation under the provisions of this Charter or any City ordinance, shall be a candidate for or eligible for the office of Council member or Mayor without first resigning from City employment or City office.
- If a Council member or the Mayor ceases to possess any of the qualifications or is convicted of a felony, or ceases to be a resident of the City, his office shall immediately become vacant.

Per [NRS 293C.185](#), the following must be presented to the filing officer: a valid driver's license or identification card issued by a governmental agency that contains a photograph of the candidate and the candidate's residential address; or a current utility bill, bank statement, paycheck, or document issued by a governmental entity, including a check which indicates the candidate's name and residential address, but not including a voter registration card issued pursuant to [NRS 293.517](#).

The above proof of identity shall be copied and retained by the filing officer and may not be withheld from the public and must not contain the social security number, driver's license or identification card number, or account number of the candidate.

## Name Requirements:

Candidates' names will appear in surname alphabetical order by office on the ballot. Partisan offices will have an indication of each candidate's party or "no political party" (NPP), as applicable. All nonpartisan offices will have NP (nonpartisan) after the name of each candidate (NRS 293.256, 293.2565, 293.263, 293.265, and 293.267).

Names must meet legal requirements for the use of given names, surnames and nicknames:

- **Professional/Occupational References:** Titles, designations or other references indicating a candidate's profession or occupation are not allowed (NRS 293.256);
- **Given Names and Surnames:** Candidates' names may be their given name and surname or a contraction or familiar form of their given name followed by their surname (NRS 293.2565(1));
- **Nicknames:** Candidates' names may include a nickname of 10 letters or less. On the ballot, the nickname will appear in quotation marks immediately before the surname. Nicknames must NOT: (a) Indicate any political, economic, social or religious view or affiliation; (b) Be the name of any living or dead person with a known statewide, nationwide or worldwide reputation; (c) Deceive a voter in any way regarding the candidate or his or her principles (NRS 293.2565(1)).
- **Candidates with the Same Given Name and Surname:** If none of the candidates is an incumbent, the middle names or initials, if any, of the candidates must be included (NRS 293.2565(2)(a)); If one of the candidates is an incumbent, the incumbent's name must be listed first and the word "Incumbent" must appear next to it (NRS 293.2565(2)(b)).

## Contribution and Expense Reports

Each candidate is **required** to file electronically all four Contribution and Expenses Reports as required by NRS Chapter [294A.350](#) **even if the candidate:**

- Withdraws his or her candidacy; or ends campaign without formally withdrawing;
- Runs for office unopposed;
- Is defeated in the primary election;
- Is removed from the ballot by court order;
- Receives no contributions or has no campaign expenses; or
- Is elected, and the subject of a petition to recall and the special election is not held.

These reports must be filed by:

- Report No. 1 – **April 15, 2024** (reporting period 1/1/24-3/31/24)
  - Report No. 2 – **July 15, 2024** (reporting period 4/1/24-6/30/24)
  - Report No. 3 – **October 15, 2024** (reporting period 7/1/24-9/30/24)
  - Report No. 4 - **January 15, 2025\*** (reporting period 10/1/24-12/31/24)
  - Annual Report–**January 15, 2025** (reporting period 1/1/24-12/31/24)
- \*(Report #4 suffices for the 2023 Annual Filing only if Report #'s 1, 2, 3 are previously filed for this period.

## Financial Disclosure Statements

Public officers entitled to receive annual compensation of \$6,000 or more shall file a statement of financial disclosure. The statement must disclose sources of income, any interest in real property, each creditor, any gifts (\$200+) received from a donor, and any business entities involved with for the full calendar year immediately preceding the date of filing.

The Financial Disclosure Statement must be filed by March 25, 2024

Campaign Contributions and Expenses Reports and the Financial Disclosure Statement are required to be filed electronically with the Secretary of State’s office. To file the report, you must access Aurora by visiting [www.nvsos.gov](http://www.nvsos.gov) and click the Aurora icon on the homepage. Chapter [294A](#) of the Nevada Revised Statutes addresses campaign practices. The Office of the Boulder City Clerk does not provide legal advice or opinions. Candidates should consult their legal counsel for interpretation or additional information.

## Acknowledgement of Ethical Standards

All elected officials, once per term of office, must file a "Nevada Acknowledgment of Ethical Standards for Public Officials" (NRS 281A.480 and 281A.500). Per NRS 281A.500(7), if a public officer is serving in a public office and files the Acknowledgment form for that office as required by NRS 281A.500, the public officer shall be deemed to have satisfied the requirements of NRS 281A.500 for any other office held concurrently by him or her.

The Ethics Acknowledgment must be filed by January 15 of the year following the general election, for each term of office. (NRS 281A.500(4)(a)).

Willful refusal to execute and file the Acknowledgment constitutes a willful violation of NRS 281A.480, subject to the Commission on Ethics filing a complaint in the appropriate court for the elected official's removal for nonfeasance in office pursuant to NRS 283.440 (NRS 281A.500 (10)).

## Electioneering Restrictions [\(NRS 293.361\)](#)

Electioneering is prohibited within 100 feet from the entrance to the building or structure in which a polling place for early voting is open for voting. Electioneering is defined as campaigning for or against a candidate, ballot question, or political party by:

- Posting signs supporting or opposing a candidate, ballot question, or political party.
- Distribution of literature relating to the support of or opposition to a candidate, ballot question, or political party.
- Using loudspeakers to broadcast information relating to the support of or opposition to a candidate, ballot question, or political party.
- Buying, selling, wearing, or displaying any badge, button, or other insignia that expressly refers to any political party or a candidate or ballot question to be voted upon in the current election, except that a person may wear political insignia while voting only if reasonably unable to cover or remove it (but that person must vote and leave as expediently as possible)
- Soliciting signatures to any kind of petition.

## Electioneering/Campaigning Protocol

*at City of Boulder City Facilities*

There is no statutory language that prohibits the distribution of election campaign handouts prior to Election Day, except during the time a polling place is open for early voting.

The Parks and Recreation gym will be utilized for early voting, so displaying of political signs or campaign buttons, distributing campaign brochures, advocating for a candidate or any other related actions cannot occur within one hundred (100) feet from the entrance to the voting area.

Candidates should examine county regulations and city ordinances for rules regarding campaign signs. In addition, state law governs campaign signs placed within highway rights-of way.

Please note: No political signs can be placed within state highway right-of-ways.

You must obtain permission from property owners prior to placing campaign sign on private property.

The posting of campaign signs on public utility poles is prohibited, per NRS 704.638.

### Boulder City Code, Chapter 11-24 Sign and Advertising Structures

#### 11-24-9 Signs not Subject to Permit Requirements:

In addition to the signage rights and rules which are defined by zone, the following signs are allowed in any zone, without a permit, subject to the conditions stated:

C. Noncommercial Messages. Signs displaying noncommercial messages, such as (by way of example, and not limitation), opinions on matters of religion, politics, social policy, etc., may be displayed at any time and in any zone, subject to:

- 1. Commercial And Industrial Zones. In commercial and industrial zones, as allowed under the message substitution policy.
- 2. Residential Zones. In residential zones, per residential unit, at all times:

Maximum area	6 square feet per sign
Maximum height (if freestanding)	4 feet
Illumination	Not allowed

If the sign structure is permanent in physical nature, then all applicable building and safety code requirements shall be met.

3. Temporary Increase In Noncommercial Message Signs Area. During the period beginning sixty (60) days before any primary, special or general election, and ending five (5) days thereafter, the amount of sign area used for noncommercial speech messages may be increased as follows:

- a. In commercial and industrial zones: An additional eighteen (18) square feet of sign area;
- b. In residential zones: An additional fourteen (14) square feet of sign area per sign.

### 11-24-5. - BASIC POLICIES:

The policies and principles stated in this section apply to all signs within the regulatory scope of this chapter, and to all procedures set forth in, or invoked by, this chapter. These policies are to prevail over any other provision to the contrary, even if more specific.

.....

E. Substitution Of Messages. Subject to the property owner's consent, a noncommercial message of any type may be substituted for any duly permitted or allowed commercial message or any duly permitted or allowed noncommercial message, provided that the sign structure or mounting device is legal without consideration of message content. Such substitution of message may be made without any additional approval or permitting. This provision prevails over any more specific provision to the contrary within this chapter. The purpose of this provision is to prevent any inadvertent favoring of commercial speech over noncommercial speech, or favoring of any particular noncommercial message over any other noncommercial message. This provision does not create a right to increase the total amount of signage on a parcel, lot or use; does not affect the requirement that a sign structure or mounting device be properly permitted; and does not allow the substitution of an off site commercial message in place of an on site commercial message.

.....

J. Property Owner's Consent. No sign may be displayed without the consent of the legal owner(s) of the property on which the sign is mounted or displayed. For purposes of this policy, "owner" means the holder of the legal title to the property and all parties and persons holding a present right to possession, control or use of the property.

# Candidate Communications and Social Media/ Use of City Facilities

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## Candidate Communications and Social Media:

All communication by candidates with members of the Boulder City Council and City staff using email, text messages, and/or social media platforms is subject to applicable provisions of the Nevada Public Records Act and the Nevada Open Meeting Law on all personal and City-issued devices.

Use of the City of Boulder City brand marks (logos) by third parties must be requested through the Communication Department and is subject to review and approval. The Communications Department is responsible for governing the City's brand and maintaining the City's brand standards.

## Use of City Facilities:

A Special Event Permit is required and can be obtained online through the registration system or in person at the Boulder City Parks and Recreation Office. Boulder City requires a certificate of insurance naming the City of Boulder City as additionally insured.

## 7-5-6 USE BY ORGANIZED GROUPS:

A. Special Events License And Special Use Permit. Any person, company, association, organization or group desiring to use any facility or area of a public park for a particular purpose such as a picnic, party, celebration, services, exercise or any other activity must obtain a special events license and/or special use permit and comply with the requirements therefor as provided in this Code and applicable regulations of the Parks and Recreation Department.

## Early Voting Procedures

Before you are allowed to vote, an election official will verify your eligibility and signature using a computer connected to the Election Department's centralized voter registration files. Your voter record will be updated immediately as part of your processing, thus preventing the possibility of an individual voting twice. Early voting results are reported after 7 p.m. on Election Day.

As of 2022, Nevada will have all-mail ballot elections. All Boulder City voters who are registered to vote no later than 14 days before Election Day will automatically receive a mail ballot whether or not they requested one, unless they opted-out.

## Opt-Out

To opt-out, a voter must submit a written or online Mail Ballot Preference Form as notification that they do not want a mail ballot. A printable form is available on the Clark County Election Department's website at [www.ClarkCountyNV.gov/vote](http://www.ClarkCountyNV.gov/vote)

## Mail Ballot Delivery

Delivery of mail ballots will begin no later than 20 days before early voting.

## Mail Ballot Drop Off Boxes

Secure, locked mail ballot drop boxes will be at all early voting and Election Day voting sites and the Boulder City Clerk's office. A voter may deposit their mail ballot in a drop box instead of sending it through the mail.

## In-Person Voting

A voter may vote in-person instead of by mail, to do so they will need to do one of the following:

- Surrender their mail ballot at a designated voting site (preferably in the packet sent)
- If a voter does not have their mail ballot, they will be required to sign an affirmation at the voting site swearing that they have not already voted in the current election

## Mail Ballot Deadlines

Voted mail ballots returned through the post office Must be postmarked no later than Election Day.

All voted mail ballots returned through the post office Must be received by the Election Department by **5 pm** on June 15, 2024 for the Primary Election and November 9, 2024 for the General Election.

## Curing Mail Ballots

The deadline for curing mail ballot signature issues is **5 pm** on June 17, 2024 for the Primary Election and November 12, 2024 for the General Election.

# IMPORTANT

## Tips for Mail Ballot Voting

- **Only put your own ballot in your own return envelope.** If more ballots than your own are in the envelope when returned, none of the ballots will be counted.
- **Sign the outside of the return envelope.**
- **Clearly mark the ballot per the instructions.** DO NOT sign the actual ballot.
- **Return the voted ballot as soon as possible.** Mail it as soon as possible or deposit it at one of the drop-off sites.

## Candidate Names on Official Ballot ([NRS 293.2565](#)).

The use of a nickname in conjunction with the candidate's legal name is allowed, and the nickname may be printed on the official ballots in accordance with the provisions. A nickname of not more than 10 letters may be incorporated into the name of a candidate. The nickname must be in quotation marks and appear immediately before the surname of the candidate. A nickname must not indicate any political, economic, social or religious view or affiliation and must not be the name of any person, living or dead, whose reputation is known on a statewide, nationwide or worldwide basis, or in any other manner deceive a voter regarding the person or principles for which he or she is voting.

## At-Large Voting

All candidates running for elective office shall be voted upon by the registered voters of the city at large. Every person who resides within the city at the time of holding any municipal election, and whose name appears upon the official register of voters in and for the city is entitled to vote at each municipal election for all offices to be voted for, and on all questions that may be submitted.

## Candidates Receiving Votes Equal to a Majority of Voters Casting Ballots in the Primary Election

If, in the primary municipal election, a candidate receives votes equal to a majority of voters casting ballots in that election, he or she shall be considered elected to one of the vacancies and his or her name shall not be placed on the ballot for the general municipal election.

## Candidates ~ General Election Ballot

If in the Primary Election no candidate receives a majority of voters casting ballots in that election for the office for which he is a candidate, the names of the two candidates receiving the highest number of votes for each seat shall be placed on the ballot for the General Election.

## Election Night

After the polls close at 7 pm on Election Day, the results are delivered to the Clark County Election Center central tabulation facility for processing. They are tabulated along with early voting and mail ballot results. The Boulder City Clerk remains on site observing this process. Internet access to unofficial election results are available after 7pm. The results are updated approximately every 20 minutes.
