## City's Damboree Parade/fireworks highlight July 4 festivities

Each year, the City of Boulder City provides a day-long Independence Day celebration for residents and visitors. The day begins with a Rotary Club pancake breakfast at 7 a.m. in the City's Bicentennial Park at 1100 Colorado Street. Beginning in the historic downtown core of the City, the Damboree Parade will launch at 9 a.m. at the intersection of Colorado Street and Nevada Way. It continues down Nevada Way to Fifth Street and on Fifth Street to Avenue B. A "water zone" — the only place along the parade route where water play is allowed and encouraged — will be on 5th Street from Avenue A to Avenue B and down Avenue B to 6th Street where the parade ends in Broadbent Memorial Park. Festivities that include food booths, games, and a flag-raising ceremony will continue in Broadbent Park beginning at 10 a.m. At 4 p.m., the event moves to Veteran's Memorial Park in preparation for the evening's fireworks show that kicks off at 9 p.m. Food, games, music and a water park will be available throughout the afternoon and evening. Entrance to all festivities are provided at no charge except for a \$10 per vehicle parking fee in Veteran's Memorial Park.



## Governor signs Bill with funds for Railroad Museum and Linear Park expansion

With the stroke of a pen, Governor Steve Sisolak signed Assembly Bill 84 (A.B. 84), a bond reauthorization bill that includes funds for State Museums Friday morning. The Bill passed the Assembly 39-0 and the Senate 20-1. Testimony for the bill suggested up to \$25 million for construction of the Southern Nevada Railroad Museum and Linear Park in Boulder City. That funding would be used for phases one and two of the three-phased, \$35 million project, which includes a new 9,700 sq. ft. visitor's center, new boarding platforms and Boulder City Linear Park that would include children interactive amenities.



"I'm excited about the opportunity to share Boulder City's evolution from the hungry, hard-working 31ers who built Hoover Dam to the leader in green energy that we've become today," remarked Mayor Rod Woodbury. "I want to personally thank our diligent management team and lobbyists, as well as Senator Joe Hardy and Assemblyman Glen Leavitt, for getting behind the vision, showing determination and ingenuity when our chances didn't look so promising, and each playing instrumental roles to secure this hard-fought funding."

"Passage of A.B. 84 was truly a team effort on so many levels," said Al Noyola, City Manager. "From the support of the Mayor and Council, to the efforts of City Hall staff, the determination of the Boulder City Chamber of Commerce and Economic Vitality Commission, to the leadership of Nevada State Museums, so many people advocated for this bill. It is a great day for Boulder City and the entire region."

Assembly Bill 84 provides \$217.5 million in state bonding authority for projects across the State of Nevada. Voters originally approved the bond in 2001. The reauthorization will not impact Nevada's general fund.

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### Final day for voting is June 11

The final chance to vote in the City of Boulder City's general election will be June 11 from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

In-person voting will take place at the Martha P. King Elementary School at 888 Adams Blvd. and at the city's Parks & Recreation building at 900 Arizona St.

The ballot will include the offices of mayor and two city council members as well as four ballot questions.
